



ANCHORING AND MOORING

Capricorn Bunker Group and Coast

The Great Barrier Reef is a nautical paradise. As you navigate the waters among the Capricorn Bunker Group and along the coast, please keep your ripple effect small by practising careful anchoring and mooring.

Doing so helps ensure the region remains enjoyable for everyone while protecting its delicate marine habitats, like coral reefs.

This guide provides vital information on anchoring and public moorings, along with key practices to safeguard this remarkable natural wonder for future generations.

Responsible practices





 Anchor in sand or mud, away from coral, when moorings aren't available.
 Use only the necessary chain and line.



 Avoid feeding fish at moorings to help ensure a safe and sustainable environment for all.

Public moorings

Public moorings are available at popular locations throughout the region. These blue cone-shaped buoys have a colour-coded band indicating class (vessel length), time limits and wind strength limits.

Using moorings

- · Moorings are first-come, first-served.
- Use the right mooring suited to your vessel and weather conditions.
- · Only one vessel per public mooring; attach at front.
- Observe time limits (usually two hours, four hours or 24 hours).
- Vacate when your time is up; overnight stays are from 3 pm to 9 am.

Private moorings are also in the area and can be identified by colours such as white, fluorescent pink, orange or yellow. These require the owner's permission before use.

No-anchoring areas

No-anchoring areas protect coral reefs from anchor damage and are indicated by reef protection markers—white pyramid-shaped buoys with a blue label. There are six no-anchoring areas in this region, located at:

- Wilson Island
- Heron Island
- · Fitzroy Reef
- Lady Musgrave Island
- Pancake Creek
- · Lady Elliot Island

Anchoring with care

- You may enter these areas; however, never anchor inside of markers.
- · Anchoring is allowed on beaches if no tidal restrictions.
- Do not attach your vessel to reef protection markers; they are not designed for that purpose.

It is an offence to damage coral in the marine parks.

 3. Be aware of changing weather and sea conditions and your proximity to obstacles, including coral and other vessels, and how these may be affected by mooring swing.

 4. Refer to instructions specified or included on the tag or buoy.
